

InDesign accessibility course syllabus

Learn to design digital documents for accessibility using InDesign. The course teaches how to create documents that follow common accessibility standards such as WCAG and Section 508, and teaches participants how to structure content within InDesign to support screen readers and assistive technologies. Learn the proper use of metadata, paragraph styles, alternative text, reading order, bookmarks, and form elements, as well as techniques for creating accessible tables and interactive PDFs. The course also teaches how to fix files and address problems that may be discovered after export, including editing tag structures, correcting reading order, ensuring appropriate color contrast. This course also covers validating navigation and interactive elements to meet accessibility guidelines.
